On My Mind & In My Heart...

On a Sunday evening in March, Marion Hirsch invited me to come lead a session with the 10 ninth-graders in this year's Coming of Age program and their adult mentors. The topic selected for the evening was the nature of God.

One of the activities I had them do was to break up into groups according to their theological identities. The theists went to one corner of the room. The atheists went to another corner. A third corner contained those who had not made up their minds. In true Unitarian Universalist style, the fourth corner of the room was for people who rejected the choices I had offered and held an identity that did not fit neatly into any of those three categories.

Each group was given a few minutes to caucus together. The assignment was to come back to the large group with an answer to two questions: What do you want the other groups to understand about you? What question do you have for those in other groups?

In the room I noticed a reluctance to split up and divide. Could we trust that we could return to a place of togetherness? Would we all be able to come back into the group?

When the four groups came back to the center of the room something amazing happened. When each group spoke, the other groups listened respectfully and attentively. The questions came from a place of healthy curiosity.

This was a great moment: our youth – high school freshmen – were modeling safe dialogue, deep listening, seeking understanding, and respectful engagement. What a testament to our mentors and our youth program! What a testament to our church!

UPCOMING MUSICAL EVENTS:

This is an exciting spring for the Music Program. On April 11 at 7pm in the sanctuary we are holding our annual Music Gala. This year's title is "R U A U U 2 ? : Playing and Singing the Principles." Congregation members and friends will be exploring the musical meaning of the 7 Principles in many varied ways. Composers represented at this point range from Amy Beach to Tom Lehrer, Holly Near to Ray Davies (of the "Kinks"), Cyndy Lauper to Randy Newman, and our very own Richard Edwards. STP – APR 12: CHURCH WORLD SERVICE/CROP WALK (CWS/CROP):

CWS works to eradicate hunger and poverty and to promote peace and justice around the world with sustainability and self-sufficiency as priorities. CWS

seeks out local agencies that share a vision of empowering self-help. Long-standing partnerships have been forged and they are now active in more than 30 countries globally, helping farmers improve food production, building reservoirs, digging wells, laying irrigation systems, providing refugee support and internal emergency response, and much more. Some 1,500 communities sponsor annual CROP WALKS to support their efforts and to combat hunger and poverty locally. Our walk in Chapel Hill/Carrboro is a pacesetter across the nation! STP – APR 19: TREES, WATER & PEOPLE (TWP)

Energy poverty is defined as the *lack of adequate modern energy for the basic needs of cooking, warmth, and lighting*. If you had a power outage during the February snows, you experienced a glimpse of energy poverty. Currently, nearly half the world's population lacks access to electricity. The mission of TWP is to improve people's lives by helping communities to protect, conserve and manage the natural resources upon which their long-term wellbeing depends. TWP works with communities in Central America, Haiti, and Tribal Lands in the U.S., using a community-based model built on the philosophy that the best way to help communities is to involve them directly in the design and implementation of development projects. Examples include clean cook stoves, solar energy, and reforestation. TWP's work not only benefits local communities, it also helps the planet through its commitment to sustainability.

ART IN THE SANCTUARY:

Judy Bauman paints impressionistically with thick paint, bold colors, and interesting subject matter. She applies her paint with assorted palette knives, using a brush sparingly. Imagination is the source of ideas for her work. She begins each painting with a loose charcoal sketch on canvas. Judy uses acrylic, oil, and burlap. Her greatest pleasures are "to experience an evolution of creativity for others to enjoy and to begin the next piece."

SPACE EXPLORATION CONTINUES

Spring is the time of plans and projects, per Tolstoy. That's certainly true for the Space Exploration Team, which continues its work. The effort started with the year-long analysis identifying the needs based on all the functions this church serves, including worship, fellowship, spiritual exploration, weddings, memorials and outreach. The team is working with an architect to explore possible solutions that best utilize current facilities, our grounds and serve multiple purposes to the greatest extent possible. Areas of focus include a larger group meeting space (classroom, children's Sunday

worship space, smaller weddings and memorials, meditation), more classroom space (children, youth, adults), green/cry room (weddings, memorials, babies) and preschool spaces which meet its certification needs while maximizing church use of them. STP RESULTS:

The CSM would like to thank the congregation for its very generous donation of \$1472 to TABLE. TABLE is the only area non-profit to focus exclusively on childhood hunger by providing healthy, emergency food aid to **over 400** Chapel Hill/Carrboro children every week. In addition to the **Weekend Backpack Program** TABLE also supports **Snack Chef**, which sends volunteers to local after school programs to teach children how to make healthy snacks to share with their families. **Summer TABLE**, an extension of the Weekend Backpack Program, delivers weekly nutritious food, including fresh produce from local farms, to kids for 6-8 weeks during the summer months. SANCTUARY FOR DIALOGUE (SfD) NOW A MINISTRY:

The Inter-Faith Council provides many services to those in need. Did you know? Since N. Carolina did not accept the expanded Medicaid those who

are unemployed are not eligible for Obama Care and remain uninsured. Did you know? IFC works with the homeless in providing the necessary reports for those qualified, so they can receive Social Security Disability. Did you know? If you had a felony charge that you are not eligible for food stamps based on your record. One more: Did you know? There are many more homeless women who are not identified due to living with friends and relatives. Our Church can be proud to be one of the founding members of IFC.
