How can we move easily in this world with respect for all? How can we confront derogatory language and behavior? Is it ever acceptable to use racial or other group slurs?



On My Mind & In My Heart...

Back in March, five brave members of the church signed up to take my Preaching Practicum class. Offered through Spiritual Education for Adults (SEA), the Preaching Practicum is a class for lay people on how to write and preach a sermon in the liberal religious tradition. Together we read selections from books about preaching, studied homiletics, and workshopped our respective ideas for sermons. In May we gathered for a preaching retreat where the class members delivered to each other and offered each other constructive feedback and critique.

The members of the class were: Bryan Sexton, Susan McDaniel, Bill Rote, Barbara Chapman, and Sue Zelt. During the months of June and July, all five of the Preaching Practicum graduates will deliver their sermons during a Sunday worship service. They’ll speak about topics they are passionate about, share spiritual insights they’ve discovered, and speak in a vulnerable way about experiences that have helped to shape them.

I hope that you will plan to attend as many of these worship services led by your peers as you can. And, next spring, I hope you’ll consider the possibility of signing up for the Preaching Practicum. There’s an old saying that I believe is true: Every single person has at least one sermon inside them.
