Sep 7 “The Compassion Deficit” Rev. Thom Belote

Perusing the headlines (or the comment section, god-forbid) of the news, one cannot help but be struck by the lack of compassion that exists in the world. This morning we’ll examine the art of compassion as a virtue and a spiritual practice. How do we keep our hearts attuned to compassion and how do we rededicate ourselves to the compassionate life?

Sep 14 “The Kids Are Alright” Rev. Thom Belote

In recent years we’ve seen many studies about the decline of religious participation in our country, especially among the younger generation of “millennials.” There is a lively and anxious discussion underway about why this is and what it means for the future of religious institutions. This morning Rev. Thom will talk about the opportunities and challenges this poses for Unitarian Universalism and for our church.

The third of our seven principles announces our “acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth.” Does anyone else see this as somewhat of a tension? Are we forced to choose? What does this mean for us as a community and what does it mean in our lives?

Sep 28 “Who Invented Christianity” Keith Sawyer, Ph.D., guest speaker

Keith Sawyer is a professor at UNC and an expert in the field of creativity research. In this sermon, he draws on what we know about human innovation, and what historians have discovered about the early Christian church, to explore how Christianity came to be.



On My Mind....

Why does someone come to a Unitarian Universalist church for the first time? I believe that few people decide to attend a UU church for light and frivolous reasons. Most people, I’d have to think, don’t show up at church by accident.

The reasons are heavier. The person who comes has recently moved to a new place and is seeking to connect. She is lonely. He is grieving the loss of a loved one or is facing a difficult diagnosis. They have a child on the way or are looking to adopt and need a community to support them on their path. The children have begun to ask questions about God. Her son or daughter needs a place to be accepted for who they are. He’s wrestling with spiritual questions. She’s recently retired and wants to figure out the next chapter. They are looking for a way to make a difference in the larger world. And so on. And so forth.

If this is true – if something is at stake each time someone walks through the doors of our church – what does this mean for us? What does it mean for the welcome we give? For the hospitality we show? For the community we incarnate? For the ministries we create?

Whether you are, like me, new to The Community Church of Chapel Hill, UU, or whether you have been here a long time, I’m interested in hearing what inspired you to walk through our doors the first time you did. It’s a question I may ask you when I meet you.

Many of our cost-burdened neighbors live in substandard and/or overcrowded housing. Our church has a proud history of partnering with Habitat for

Humanity of Orange County and other churches to provide homes for our community family. Church partners pay half the construction costs; Habitat pays the other half. Families repay the Habitat share in mortgage payments that are used to fund other houses. Church members help the family with construction.

Our church hopes to start our 19th Habitat home this fall, in Habitat's new 24-home community, Tinnin Woods in Efland, near Hillsborough. SANCTUARY ART ~ SEPT 14 - OCT 26:

The art in the sanctuary from September 14 through October 26 (with a reception on October 12) is a collaboration by Barbara Tyroler and Sandy Milroy.



Barbara Tyroler is a fine art image-maker using photography in collaborative multi-media art projects that address social and cultural issues. She has an M.F.A. in digital art and an M.Ed. in education. She currently teaches an independent masters level photography class and offers workshops with Duke's Center for Documentary Studies. She administers the FRANK gallery's non-profit programs through the Community Outreach Gallery and is founder of the Triangle Photography Consortium.



Sandy Milroy currently works in the mediums of collage and acrylic painting. She uses handmade papers, paint, and micro-pens to achieve intricate compositions, abstract or derived from nature. Sandy has a B.A degree in art history. After moving to North Carolina, she began weaving and studied at the Penland, Arrowmont, and Haystack craft schools. In the

1970s she lived in Zambia, Scotland, and England. After returning to Chapel Hill in 1981, she completed graduate studies in the textile design program at NC State University and produced fine scale tapestry pins and wall pieces. She is a member of the Orange County Artist Guild. She is also a member artist at the FRANK Gallery in Chapel Hill.

The Collaboration: Initially photographed by Barbara during a nine-day visit to Beijing, these portraits present a glimpse into the internal landscape of the subjects, seen from a foreigner's perspective, within the backdrop of Beijing's rapidly changing external landscape.

Beijing Impressions, a 2 Person Multi-media Collaboration, pushes the work a step further into abstraction. Using Barbara's original work from her Beijing Impressions portrait series, the artists then selected complementary work from Sandy's collections as source material to create new work that reinterpreted and recombined original imagery of both artists. With attention to modifications of composition, light, tonality, mood shift, and layering, Sandy expanded Barbara's photographs with handmade, hand-painted papers to create more complex collages; while Barbara re-photographed and reused some of Sandy's collages to provide more intricate photo composites.

EL CENTRO HISPANO, Inc. will be the recipient of the October 5, 2014, Share the Plate.

El Centro Hispano (ECH) founded in 1992, is a grassroots community-based organization dedicated to strengthening the Latino community and improving the quality of life for Latino residents in Durham, Carrboro, Chapel Hill, and the surrounding areas.

From 2000 to 2010, the North Carolina Latino population grew by 111%. Similarly, the Orange County Latino population grew by 108.9%.

In July 2010, ECH opened its first satellite office in Carrboro at the request of Orange County leaders. ECH has replicated and adapted many of the programs that

have been most successful and needed in Durham County for the Orange County Latino population.

ECH has also begun to work with local partners and town officials in the development of a workers' center for day laborers and domestic workers.

The Community Service Committee of The Community Church, in collaboration with El Centro Hispano, will be hosting a Latino Fiesta to support the development of a Workers Center at the Carrboro location. This center will facilitate the development of a relationship between members of the Latino community seeking employment and potential employers in a safe environment. There will be an amazing, authentic Mexican buffet and music for listening and dancing provided by Saludos Compay, under the direction of Erich Lieth. Tickets @ \$20 each will include two glasses of wine and may be purchased at the table in the Jones Building after the services beginning August 17th.

CHANGES AT CHARLES HOUSE:

Charles House opened in 1990 with a clear philosophy of how to care for elderly people in a day care setting. That philosophy remains today, but 3 years ago they opened a small residential unit in Heritage Hills. They are now almost ready to open the second small residential unit in Winmore. These houses provide 24-hour care, but still follow the basic Charles House way of doing things.

It has now been announced that by the summer of 2015 Charles House will relocate to the campus of Carol Woods and use the building that was built as a day care center. Much planning and hard work will be involved in this transition, but the leaders feel it is the right time to expand the day care operation. As more details become available, you will be informed, since Charlie Jones, for whom the day care was begun, was our first minister.

NEW WELLSPRING GROUP FORMING:

The Wellspring program, an integrated and unique Unitarian Universalist program for deepening one's spiritual journey in a group setting, is open to new participants this fall. Participants are invited to deepen their individual spiritual callings through an intentional program of daily spiritual practice, spiritual mentoring, focused study, reflection, and small group meetings using deep listening.

Wellspring participants commit to a nine-month program of bi-weekly meetings in order to develop their daily spiritual practice. Also available are monthly meetings with a spiritual director or guide to deepen the experience. Meetings are often structured around reading and writing assignments along a particular
