## THE LEARNING CIRCLE



In many discussion groups, it is only the most assertive and eloquent people whose ideas get expressed. This leaves a lot of good thinking and ideas off the table.

The learning circle is a way to give everyone a chance to state their ideas on an equal footing.

## Here's how it works:

- 1. Someone agrees to lead the circle.
- 2. The leader explains the <u>rules of the learning circle</u>:
  - a. one person will start and we will go around the circle in order
  - b. there is no cross-talk or commenting from others
  - c. if someone does not want to share when it's their turn, they say "I'll pass"
  - d. at the end, the leader will check with the people who have "passed" to see if they have something they want to share
  - e. a general discussion can occur after the learning circle has completed
- 3. The leader <u>states a specific, limited question</u> for everyone to address.
- 4. The leader asks who would like to start.
- 5. Someone offers to start and answers the question.
- 6. The next person either on the left or the right goes next.
- 7. If someone doesn't want to speak they say "I'll pass".
- 8. If any cross-talk or commenting occurs, the leader gently reminds people of the rules.
- 9. After everyone has had an opportunity to speak, the leader goes back to those who have "passed" to see if they have something they want to share.
- 10. The leader can conduct a general discussion after the circle has been completed.
